


In the meantime, I hope you all continue to have a safe and restful summer and fall!

## DIRT & The Soil We Walk On

I visited the jobsite of my new home recently and accidentally stepped in some fresh mud from the previous day of rain. Luckily, I was wearing old sneakers! I have watched as my new home is being built and it got me thinking. The foundation of the home is built within the dirt. The land around the job site is quite dirty and when it rains, and it gets quite muddy. Lots of good things begin with dirt.

Jesus didn't say a whole lot about dirt. He 'mentions, "Wherever you enter a house, stay there until you leave the place. If any place will not welcome you and they refuse to hear you, as you leave, shake off the dust that is on your feet as a testimony against them." So, they went out and proclaimed that all should repent. They cast out many demons and anointed with oil many who were sick and cured them. (Mark 6:10-13)." Of course, other scripture verses mention the earth

but not too many speak of dirt or mud.

In a way, we can almost assume the disciples and Jesus would be dirty quite frequently. A few of them were fisherman (fish don't exactly smell clean by our standards today) and whenever they traveled, they walked everywhere. In Biblical times, roads were not paved as they are today, so dirt must have been all over. When it rained, some places probably got muddy too.

In modern times, we like to feel clean. We like to keep ourselves out of the dirt, out of the mud, and on dry pathways. However, dirt is good! We need soil. Here's an excerpt from Jesus' "Parable of the




Sower" in Mark 4: "...
Other seeds fell into good soil and brought forth grain, growing up and increasing and yielding thirty and sixty and a hundredfold. (Mark 4:8)"

When we plant a garden, when we plant crops, they are all planted in soil. Our rolling hills in Pennsylvania are fertile and produce good crops. When we plant in good

soil, our crops multiply and produce good fruit! The dirt holds our homes, our church building, and soil provides a home for many creatures and plants. The same is true in ministry. Ministry carries us to many places and many different people. When we plant the Good News among our friends and neighbors, we never know what good fruit may come from our words and actions!

God calls us to do what we can, where we are, in the time that we have. Sometimes we will get dirty and sometimes we will be called to plant our ministry in new soil. The soil we build in, plant in, and walk on carries us to all kinds of places in Jesus' name. Amen.





## Highlights of Church Council Meeting August 22, 2024

- The income for June was a little higher than the normal \$13,000 \$15,000, totaling \$19,953.
- The income for July included \$10,729.00 in offering for the month. A little lower than June.
- The water/sewer for 2<sup>nd</sup> quarter was a little higher than normal at \$369.55. This is still being looked into.
- Camping Scholarship monies was used in full.
   There is thought to have been 7 campers this summer from our church.
- Pastor reported that she is consistently hearing from several shut-in members that they cannot hear her while watching the service online. She would really like to have the sound system looked at and fixed if the cost would be reasonable.
- Pastor will be on vacation over her birthday from 8/30 - 9/3/24 as well as 10/9 - 10/22/24 for moving. Supply Pastors: Rev Michael Yesenko -9/1/24 & Rev Bonnie Oplinger - 10/13/24 & 10/20/24.
- The exhaust fan and kitchen refrigerator were fixed on 8/21/24.

- Security Camera Update: The security cameras are being installed. There are 3 cameras working in the back parking lot so far, one camera
- installed on Lehman Street and one looking down the back alley. The work will be completed next week.
- Pastor Althea's installation is scheduled for Sunday September 29, 2024 at 9:00 a.m.
- Childcare Update: The Nursery carpeting has been professionally cleaned. The cabinets and cubicles were emptied and have been painted in the Nursery & the Toddler room. The furniture and toys not needed by the childcare have been removed from these rooms. The final inspection will be on Monday August 26, 2024. Everything will be ready by September 1st. The first day of operation is scheduled for Monday September 9, 2024.
- There was a brief discussion on finding a youth representative for Council.

## September 25: Rattlesnakes Demystified by Dr. Scott Boback

Snakes in general, and rattlesnakes in particular, are probably one of the most abhorred animals in the western Hemisphere. Some of this fear is because rattlesnakes are venomous and can harm or kill people. But do we really know much about them? In this talk we will journey into the world of a rattlesnake to reveal how they sense their environment, how and when they use their venom, and how they obtain water when none can be found. Hopefully by the end of the talk you will gain a greater appreciation for these often maligned animals. Dr. Scott Boback is a Professor in the Biology Department at Dickinson College where he has been teaching and doing research since 2007. An animal ecologist with a focus in herpetology, Dr. Boback is widely known for his groundbreaking research on snakes - specifically constrictors. Two of his research findings regarding boas detecting their prey's heartbeat, as well as debunking the myth that constrictors kill their prey via suffocation, were covered by dozens of media outlets, including The New York Times, BBC, National Geographic, Smithsonian, MSNBC and German Public Radio. Some of his work has been the subject of video productions that can be seen on the Discovery Channel, National Geographic Explorer, and National Geographic Television. Current research in Dr. Boback's lab focuses on the biomechanics of jumping in American Toads, the use of American Toads in organic farm pest management, and the ecology and behavior of Prairie Rattlesnakes in the Rocky Mountains.


## **Aluminum Can Collection**


The church continues to collect aluminum cans for recycling. Please bring the aluminum cans (rinsed & flattened) to the church weekdays during church

## Mission Trip 2024

On Sunday, June 23rd, seven volunteers arrived at Camp Kirchenwald to stay the week for our mission trip. Throughout the week, 33 others joined us during the day to do our work from 5 Lebanon County Lutheran churches: Trinity, Friedens, Zion's Lutheran in Jonestown, Millcreek Lutheran, and Trinity Lutheran, Colebrook. We also had volunteers from Holy Spirit and Gavel Hill United Methodist churches in Palmyra.

Camp Kirchenwald and Wittel Farm Property Manager, Pastor Mark Russell, had prepared several projects for us to do. We are so proud of our youth volunteers who really dedicated themselves to this mission!

Monday, 21 volunteers traveled to Wittel Farm. Most of our workers moved mulch including Zac Kaylor and Camden Snyder who had a blast driving the tractor. Seven people stained picnic tables and benches. Four of our skilled men started the roof replacement over the dining room which was completed in 2  $\frac{1}{2}$  days. We so enjoyed a visit from Pastor Connie Youse!

The work the rest of the week was completed at Camp Kirchenwald where the counselors, kitchen staff and everyone we came in contact with were very appreciative of what we were accomplishing there. Craig Brightbill led a crew with Ron Birch who worked for 4 days replacing pavers on the walkway to SchreiberHaus which now looks fantastic! Zac Kaylor and Sammy Seiders did an outstanding job helping to erect a car port in 3 ½ days. London Seiders cleaned like nobody's business with Nancy Brightbill, Beth Moore and her granddaughter, Madelyn, and others in both SchreiberHaus and Myers retreat center. Karen



Fitting was a carpet shampooing machine taking 3 days to clean the carpeted areas in SchreiberHaus. Denise McDaniels and her daughter Erinn Rowe enjoyed working together by eliminating a very invasive plant, Asian Knotwood and staining benches. Tending to trees and lessons in botany were led by our own Jim Logan. Kitty Logan, Pastor Althea, Judy Cassel, Carol Koehler and Karen and Terry Weaver were on that crew.

Other projects included: Staining of benches, picnic tables and a lifeguard stand, gardening, clearing paths of debris, painting of exterior doors and the Wittel Farm dining room ceiling, mowing, moving furniture and materials in the barn, power washing a trailer, cleaning out and modifying the pool shed and a wood shed. Alizah Engel pitched in where needed including helping to move the wood pile.


