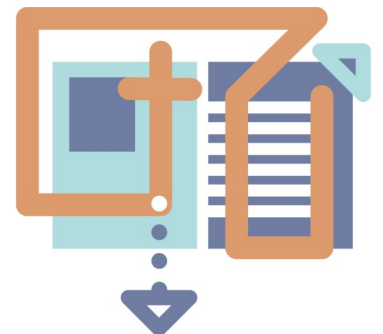

Santa Clause was a Real Person!

Santa Clause is a shortened way of saying Saint Nicolas, whose life the Church commemorates on December 6th. There has been multiple stories and legends told about him over centuries. What is actually known about him is that he was born in the late 3rd century in Patara, a village on the southern coast of today's Turkey. He was orphaned as a boy and raised by his devout Christian grandparents. As a young man he became a priest and shortly after was elect the Bishop of Myra, a city near Patara. He was imprisoned during the persecution of Christians under Roman Emperor Diocletian. After Christianity became legal by Emperor Constantine, Nicholas attended the Council at Nicaea in 325. He died on December 6, 343.

Because his father was a wealthy merchant, Nicholas inherited a large fortune when he came of age. Yet Nicolas lived simply, choosing to aid those in need as they came to his attention by giving anonymous gifts from his inheritance. But his generosity did not remain a secret.

The story told is that a very poor family had three daughters who were reaching marrying age. The Roman custom at the time was that the father of a young woman had to provide a dowry to her perspective husband. Without a dowry a girl had virtually no chance of marriage, resulting in a life of destitution or even being sold into slavery. Nicolas heard of these girls' plight and just as each sister reached marrying age, he crept up to their house in the dark of night and dropped a bag of gold through



an open window for her dowry. A plot was hatched to discover who was engaged in such generosity.

Knowing that the donor put a bag of gold through the window twice before, some men hid in wait for whoever it was to arrive for the third time. So Nicolas was caught "red-handed" so to speak. Word spread rapidly of Nicolas' benevolences, especially to the children in and near Myra. Others began imitating Nicolas, particularly giving anonymous gifts on December 6th. When ask who these gifts were from, the answer was, "They are from St. Nicolas." So as the custom spread from country to country it took many forms.

In many places, since the Christ child received gifts upon his birth, the giving of gifts to children by St. Nicolas became associated with Christmas. It has been suggested that Santa's gift giving should return to December 6th so the true significance of Christmas could be emphasized once again. Do you think that is possible in the commercialized world we live in today?

The Light of the World

"In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth, the earth was complete chaos, and darkness covered the face of the deep, while a mighty wind from God swept over the face of the waters. Then God said, 'Let there be light.'"
Genesis 1:1-3a

Every day our body senses when to wake by the natural light in our environment. Our circadian rhythm also tells us when to sleep and rise to a new day. 














