Dear Congregation,

On October 11th 33 mailing boxes filled with Lutheran World Relief 2024 donations were delivered to Salem Lutheran Church, our drop off point for the Lutheran World Relief campaign. These boxes will be delivered to New Windsor, Maryland and from there distributed to points of need throughout the world. Holy Trinity responded to global need by preparing 126 school kits packed in 18 shipping boxes and 101 personal care kits packed in 15 shipping boxes. Holy Trinity's Annual Bazaar

The roots of Holy Trinity's annual bazaar are found with the formation of the Children's Department of our Bible School in September 1931. Its teachers organized their own teachers' association and adopted teaching the Children's Life Course, but had no budget for equipment and the improvement of the ground floor of what is now our Christian Education building for their classes, since our country was then in the grip of the Great Depression. So, the association hit upon the idea of having bazaars as fund raisers.

Their first annual bazaar was held on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday evenings, from 6:00 to 10:30 p.m., November 21-23, 1933. Each year's bazaar was organized around a theme such as "Pilgrims," "Holland," and "Mother Goose," with appropriate costumes,

decorations and entertainment. Booths sold such items as grab-tree gifts, church calendars, Christmas cards, and Christmas gifts. Foods sold included soup, hot dogs, pie, cake, candy, ice cream, apple cider, and coffee. Noon lunches were offered for the first time at the "Yuletide" bazaar in 1938. Yet the 1938 bazaar was the last one organized by the Children's Department's teacher's association in response to criticism that it should not be involved in commercialism to support a church program which should be supported by offerings from its members.

As it happened, having an annual bazaar was rescued by the Ladies Home Circle formed in 1892, which met at members' homes weekly for the purpose of using skills that then was considered strictly the women's domestic "social sphere." Over the years they visited the sick, bereaved and new members; cooked and helped at church "sociables"; made a full set of altar vestments, collected food, money, and clothing (some of which was made by the ladies themselves) for the Lutheran Orphan's Home in Philadelphia. In the 1920's such events as their "Apron Social" and " Stocking Social" were popular. Because the Home Circle had a booth selling handmade items at the

Children's Department's bazaars, the ladies continued to hold a one-day Christmas gifts bazaar while providing a light lunch each year until 1959. Because younger women were no longer becoming members of their circle, their aging members couldn't continue the work required to hold a bazaar beyond that year.

However, the young women of the Cadette Girl Scout troop stepped up to hold a bazaar on November 28, 1959. From that event an auxiliary Fellowship Bazaar Committee evolved, primarily through the leadership of Ross Boyd, into a thee day event that functioned until the Covid pandemic caused it to be suspended for two-years. In 2022, the Fellowship Bazaar Committee reintroduced the bazaar as a successful one day-event in early November. All indications point to its third year of popularity in this format. As an auxiliary, the Fellowship Bazaar Committee itself decides how the proceeds from the event are distributed for the mission of the Church.





Air and Wind

The last few months I have written devotions related to the elements of soil and fire. This month I invite us to think about air. We monitor air and weather often in society, yet we don't always think of breathing and wind as spiritual.

Before I could become a pastor in our denomination, it is customary that students go through a season of service as a chaplain in a mental health agency, care home, or hospital setting for a number of reasons. I served one summer at the Reading Hospital. I was initially concerned about seeing blood and serious injuries. (This is why I am not a nurse.) However, what bothered me that summer was seeing people having difficulty breathing. There is something about watching and hearing a person gasping for air which didn't.

Breathing is essential to much of life. Even plants go through respiration and contribute oxygen to the air around us. When we think of air and wind, Christians may recall there are some stories in the Bible where wind, storms, and air are mentioned. At Pentecost, there is a rush of wind, tongues of fire appear on the people present, and they are filled with the Holy Spirit. Some theologians believe that the Holy Spirit did not just show up at the first Pentecost. It was likely that the Holy Spirit existed since creation. In ancient Hebrew and Koine (Biblical) Greek, there is mention of the words "mmruach" and mvɛῦµα "pneuma." The words translate to wind, spirit, or breath in both languages.

Physically and spiritually, we need air. We need oxygen. Above all, we are thankful for God's Holy Spirit. We need God's breath. We need to feel the wind of God on our skin. Life begins in creation with God's breath. Life needs air. Psychologists also tell us there is much research about deep breathing and meditation which improves our mental health and ability to cope with stress.





2025 Mission Trip – Lutheran Camping Corporation

Our Mission Trip will be held at Camp Kirchenwald and possibly Wittel Farm from June 22-27, 2025.

The Bible tells us that when we serve others, we are also serving Christ. We are to commit to that service for people as if we were serving Christ himself.

From Sunday June 22-Friday June 27, 2024, we invite YOU to help us do work at Camp Kirchenwald and possibly Wittel Farm. The work has yet to be determined, but we anticipate there being some kind of construction work, clean up, repairs, painting, etc. Our home base for the week will be at Camp Kirchenwald, in the air-conditioned SchreiberHaus. This facility will provide overnight weeklong accommodations for up to 39 volunteers. Evenings consist of free-time and group activities. All meals will be provided by camp. There is an option for those who want to volunteer for the week or for only a few days but prefer to return home at the completion of the service day.

We are a Mission TEAM. There is a place for everyone. We welcome all skill levels and all levels of experience. All of us together complete the service circle. The only requirements are a willingness to learn, giving your best, and looking forward to a rewarding time of enjoyment and goodwill.

Please consider joining our team. You must be at least 14 years old by June 22rd to participate. Confirmands can earn service hours for volunteering. The cost is \$500 for volunteers who stay at camp. Commuters will pay \$15 per day of work which covers lunch. The commitment form for each volunteer is due by March 2^{rd.} Volunteers staying at camp will need to include a deposit of \$50.00.




